#### From the Parliamentarian . . .

At the February 25, 2013, Board Meeting, the LND/SMC Board recommended two amendments to the LND/SMC Bylaws. These two changes **require** approval at the Annual Meeting by a **majority** vote of those members **present**, provided that one month's notice of these amendments have been given either by mail or at a previous regular meeting.

The first amendment is to the duties of the Assistant Treasurer.

#### **Article III. Duties of Elected Board Members**

Present Section 7. The Assistant Treasurer shall assume the duties of the Treasurer in her absence and shall assist her upon call. She is Treasurer-Elect. (2010)

Proposed Section 7. The Assistant Treasurer shall disperse funds received from the use of Remembrance Cards and maintain an accurate list of names and donation information. She shall assume the duties of the Treasurer in her absence and shall assist her upon call. She is Treasurer-Elect. (2013)

The second amendment is to fiscal policies.



## SUMMARY OF LND/SMC BOARD MEETING FEBRUARY 27, 2013

The LND?SMC Board met at the Harris Branch Library on February 27, 2013. After approving the prior meeting's minutes and the Treasurer's Report, the board received updates on the program and upcoming events, areas where the budget may need to be adjusted next year, potential changes to be made to its by-laws, its request for office space and its fundraising efforts.

The Board discussed at length two potential changes to the by-laws. First, it has been proposed to add the processing of any Remembrance Cards to the duties of the Assistant Treasurer. Second, the Board has recommended that the annual dues be increased \$5 effective September 2013. The details regarding both proposals were sent to the group via email earlier in March and have been included in this newsletter as well. The vote for these proposals will be held at the Annual Business Meeting on April 24, 2013. A majority of those members present at this meeting is required for passage.

As of this newsletter printing, we have raised just over \$1,000 from our gift wrapping events for the scholarships at Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College. We have two more dates during graduation weekend (May 15 and 18) to raise some additional funds. Due to the generous gifts given in honor of LM Nancy Lucey, it has been decided that the scholarship to a Saint Mary's student next year will not only be from the Ladies of Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College but also specifically named in honor of Nancy Lucey.

Our final discussion centered around the *exciting* news that the Ladies has been offered some office space in the old security building on Notre Dame's campus. This would allow us a physical location as well as a phone number. The space has 2 closets and enough space to hold small meetings. Notre Dame has offered to re-paint and re-carpet the space. ## In Memoriam

## Eleanor Rebecca Dunn Burke November 30, 1915 - January 21, 2013



"She enjoyed life to the fullest ...."

Eleanor Rebecca Dunn Burke, 97, was born in Philadelphia, PA, to William R. and Marie Dunn. She graduated from Oberlin College, Ohio, in 1936, majoring in Sociology and from Pierce Business School, Philadelphia, PA, in 1937. She moved to Highstown, NJ, to work as secretary to the Head-master of The Peddle School. It was there that she met William R. Burke, (who preceded her in death on April 10, 1982). In Reading, PA, on August 24, 1940, she married him. She lived in San Antonio during WW II where William was a Captain in the Army. They returned to New Jersey where William earned his graduate degree in English at the University of Pennsylvania. Upon reception of his doctorate in 1949, William accepted a teaching position in the English Department at Notre Dame and they moved to South Bend, IN.

Throughout her time at Notre Dame, Eleanor was an active member of the LND/SMC, serving as a Board Member for Life Members as well as President in 1981-82. She attended many classes at Notre Dame. Few knew that from 1958-78 she taught dancing at the Junior Dance Assembly. She was active in politics as a member of the St. Joseph County Republican Women's Club. A natural athlete, Eleanor played basketball in her youth, was an active swimmer and played tennis and golf well into her eighties. Since 1949 she attended all but three ND home football games and nearly every ND basketball game. Those who knew her were very much aware that she enjoyed life to the fullest: playing bridge and attending book club discussion as well as traveling, spending time with her children, grandchildren, relatives and friends around the country and the world.

Eleanor is survived by one daughter, Kathleen Werner of Germantown, TN and two sons, William R., Jr. (Ling) of Granger, IN and Peter (Nancy) of Cota de Caza, CA, nine grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated, Friday, January 25, 2013, in Sacred Heart Basilica, Notre Dame, IN. Graveside services and burial followed at Cedar Grove Cemetery. Memorials in honor of Eleanor Burke were made to the Notre Dame Hesburgh Library and the LND/SMC Scholarship for Local Women at the University of Notre Dame, 110 Grace Hall, Notre Dame, IN 46556.

## June Marion Critchley Thomas

June 18, 1936 - January 22, 2013

June Marion Critchley was born June 18, 1935, in Stockport, England, to William and Olive Critchley. After WW II, she finished school and enrolled in the Manchester Royal Infirmary School for Nursing. It was during this time she meet John Kerry Thomas, who was pursuing a doctorate at the University of Manchester. They were married February 28, 1959, in Heaton Moor, England. In 1960 they moved to Downers Grove, IL, USA, where Kerry worked at Argonne National Laboratories. During this time a daughter and son were born. In 1969, June and Kerry moved to South Bend when Kerry was hired by Notre Dame, at which time a second son was born.

June was always the nurse and caregiver. While in South Bend she has worked at Logan Industries and volunteered at El Campito Center, The Family & Children's Center, the Teen Runaway Shelter, The Center for the Homeless and the Homeless Task Force. She touched the lives of many. She was member of LND/SMC and participated regularly in its book discussion group. She traveled around the world with her husband and returned frequently to the British Isles. For many years her family had a lake cottage in Michigan where she greatly enjoyed the birds and nature.

June passed away at home surrounded by her family after a very short battle with cancer. She is survived by her husband Dr. J. Kerry Thomas, her daughter Delia (Dave Skora) and two sons: Roland (Kim) Thomas, Valparaiso, IN, and Roger (Amy) Thomas, South Bend, IN, and eight grandchildren. She is also survived by her two sisters, Doreen Atkinson and Susan (Don) McQuade, a brother Denis Critchley, and special cousin, Jean (Brian) Singleton, all of whom reside in England. Funeral services for June were held Friday, January 25, 2013, at Grace United Methodist Church, South Bend, IN, of which she was a long-standing member. Her family will establish a special Memorial in her name.

## Margarita "Mickey" Corbaci September 13, 1921 - February 18, 2013



"She had a great sense of humor ...."

Margarita (Mickey) Corbaci passed away in her home in South Bend, IN. She was born to Joseph and Margaret (Kennedy) Williams in Albany, NY, on September 13, 1921. She graduated from Vincentian Institute in Albany, NY, in 1939. She attended the College of St. Rose in Albany until 1942 and worked for the Office of Quartermaster General in Washington, DC, until joining the WACs in 1943. Having some knowledge of French, she was stationed in France. While serving in Marseilles she met Leo Corbaci, who was also in the US Army. After her active military was completed on March 15, 1946, Mickey and Leopoldo Marc Corbaci were married on May 1, 1946, in Albany, NY.

After the war, Mickey continued her education using the GI Bill. She finished her B.A.degree in English literature at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, PA. She also studied at the Carnegie Library School in Pittsburgh receiving a Master in Library Science in 1948. In 1950, she and Leo moved to South Bend, IN. He accepted a fellowship to study economics at the University of Notre Dame. She began her long career with the South Bend Public Library. She served in many areas of the library from 1950 until her retirement in 1985, when Leo retired from Notre Dame. In 1957-1959 she worked at the Saint Mary's College Library while the new South Bend Library was being built on Wayne and Main St. At that time the library complex was renamed St. Joseph County Public Library.

Mickey and Leo enjoyed ND football weekends and the parties, hosting their many friends from years at the university and the library. Mickey loved Leo, traveling, literature, movies, the theater and cats. Toward the end of her life, she wanted to remain in her own home and received wonderful car from all of her caregivers. Her beloved Leo preceded her in death (August 1, 1994), as did her parents and her brother, Joseph. Her nieces and nephews survive her. A graveside service with military honors was held on Tuesday, February 26, 2013 in Cedar Grove Cemetery, Notre Dame, IN. Memorial contributions may be made to Hospice of St.

On February 16, 2013, members and guests of LND/SMC were treated to not only an enjoyable lunchina beautiful room in SMC Student Lounge but also to a very interesting presentation by SMC Chemistry Prof. Toni Barstis and her accomplished dual 5th year SMC Chemistry / ND Engineering student, Diana Vega Pantoja. A SMC Chemistry research team has developed a relatively inexpensive and quick method for detecting counterfeit acetaminophen and has applied for the first patent at SMC. This paper device can be very useful in places where modern laboratories are unavailable.

For most of the attendees, how medicine is delivered in pills, the dosage of the drugs, the fillers in the pills and the difficulty in detecting "fakes" was new information. Counterfeit drugs are a \$70-300 billion business worldwide.





## HARPER CANCER RESEARCH INSTITUTE

On Thursday, March 4, 2013, Dr. M. Sharon Stack, the Director of Harper Cancer Research Institute, University of Notre Dame, welcomed 18 members of LND/SMC to a presentation and tour of the newest research institute at

Notre Dame. Since her appointment in 2011, Dr. Stack has put together undergraduates,

graduate students, Institute professionals and Faculty from across many Notre Dame departments (psychology, applied mathematics/computing science, biology, chemistry, biochemistry, physics and engineering) and local medical foundations, e.g. South Bend Medical Foundation, to build on cancer research throughout the state of Indiana.

She cited how the collaborative works of many investigators in diverse areas of science have incorporated imaginative uses of science techniques not used previously in such research. Not all of the laboratories in the building are in use as Dr. Stack is still in the stage of inviting scientists to the Institute, "who those especially develop animal tumor research." The equipment in the building is "state of the art" and garnered a comment from one attendee who had in the past "spent hours with shaking hands and a very sharp knife cutting tissues and making slides," whereas now this is done by machine much more precisely economically. The institute has a tissue tumor bio-repository for what was formerly considered medical waste. Tissue samples, taken with patient's permission, have record solely of gender, age and diagnosis. Freezers are held at (- 81)° C. or (-133.8)° F. This is really cold! Dr. Stack stated that "basic research is a good investment and it is good government policy to fund such research as it increases economic gain" in a society.
