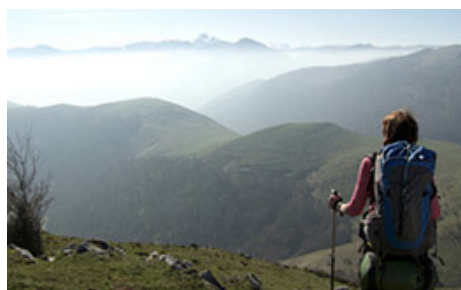

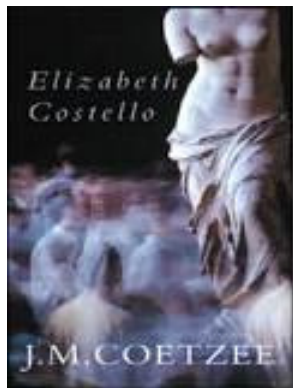
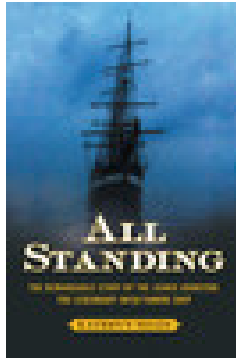

Gloria Kim is leading the discussion of *All Standing* by Katherine Miles on Thursday, March 5, 2015. Miles builds her story around the *Jeanie Johnston*, the only ship fleeing the Irish Potato Famine with a 100 percent survival rate in its many Atlantic two-month crossings. Approximately one million Irish died during this period due not only to the famine but also the cruel and inhumane policies of the British colonists.



Nobel Laureate J.M. Coetzee's *Elizabeth Costello* is the group's choice for Thursday, April 2, 2015. It is a compilation of eight Lessons (chapters) and a postscript. Two of these lessons, which are fictional narratives, were given in the 1990's as lectures by the author. Reviews put this book as, not only different, but challenging.

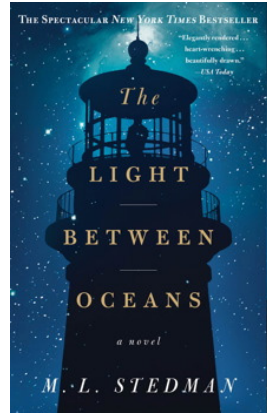

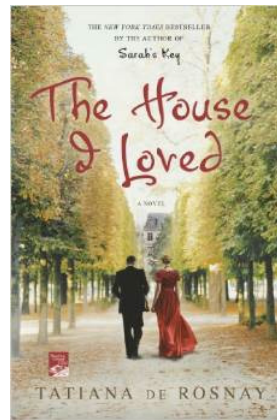

Lou Derwent will lead the discussion of Siegel's 2014 text of *The Anatomy Lesson*.

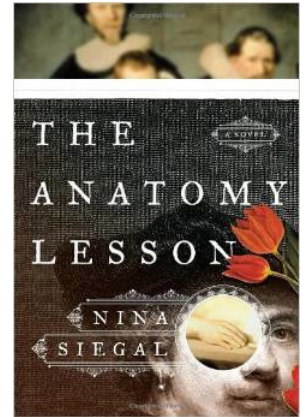
On April 20, 2015, the group will meet at the home of Marti Alworth to discuss *The House I Loved* by Tatiana DeRosnay.

Latino Culture & Art

Twenty-two women from LND/SMC accepted the invitation of Dolores and Gilberto Cardenas to come to their home, December 2, 2014, and view their incredible collection of Latino art. One of the century old structures along Riverside Drive in South Bend, their home itself was worth the visit. Jackie Welsh gave an introduction to Prof. Cardenas and in turn he related his life long journey of collecting artifacts: paintings, posters, statues, sculpture, prints, every-day objects such as bowls, glass, furniture, etc. made by Hispanic Americans for celebration and a record of their lives. He sees these artifacts as "a collection of artists, not just of art."

Born of Mexican parents, Prof. Cardenas grew up in Los Angeles, CA. He has acquired both a national and international reputation by involving himself in politics, art, religion, and education within both a narrow local community and world-wide community. Locally, he is the director of the Crossroads Gallery at the Notre Dame Art & Culture Center. A professor in the department of Sociology he is interested in immigration, race and ethnic relations.

Nationally, one of his appointments has been to the Board of *The Bill & Melinda Gates Scholarship Foundation*.

Prof. Cardenas stated that much of his work is political, recognizing the Mexican culture as indigenous to the American Southwest and West ... as it was

present long before the European settlers came to the United States. He has a strong and deep interest in our country's immigration history and policies. Intending to get a job on either the East or West Coast, she ended up working at Chicago's Roosevelt University for three years. She loved life in the big city; however, she pursued her original intention by moving for eight years to a position at Fairleigh Dickinson University in

Teaneck, NJ. While there she received a Master's in English and Comparative Literature, which included spending a month for each of two summers at Wroxton College in England. From there she came to Notre Dame and spent the next thirty-two years working in collection development with the English and French faculty. Her position included a stint of ten years as *Rare Books Librarian*

When people ask what she intends to do in retirement, she says, "I retired to work on climate change." That is partly true because her role as *Conservation Chair of the South Bend-Elkhart Audubon Society* has gotten her involved in raising awareness about climate issues, the preservation of wildlife habitat, and the joy of bird watching.

Thirty-eight years ago in 1976, Suzy Halloran joined LND/SMC as a newcomer. The women she met then, who were to become like "family," knew the good babysitters, parishes, farmer's



markets, and beaches. They read good books, played cards, tennis, and enjoyed all the culture offered by the community, who volunteered cheerfully and did incredible good. She says: "I have been blessed to share in cultures of our world

and meet women who speak many languages -- I feel enriched by their presence. It has been my pleasure and privilege to be a Lady of Notre Dame."

A native of Dubuque, Iowa, Suzy was nurtured by strong, confident, adventuresome women lovingly at home and at school. Sisters of the Visitation provided her education from kindergarten through high school. They all encouraged her to "go for it" and say "Yes" as often as possible. This led her to expand her horizons as a teenager and venture off to Fontbonne College (Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet) in St. Louis. After completing her BA, she worked at Delta Airlines and travelled as much as she could. John and she met at a Sodality mixer her junior year at FB and married in 1970. While he was in the Army, her free passes at Delta came in very handy and the paycheck was even more useful as he completed his doctorate at Washington University in St. Louis. Their first son, Brian

(ND'96) was born in St. Louis in 1974 before they arrived at Notre Dame. Their other two children, Brendan (ND'02) and Mary Brigid (ND'10) are Hoosiers. While her children were at St. Joseph Grade School (over a 20 year period), she was a "professional" volunteer, doing everything from room-mom (each grade at least once) to chair of the school board. As they moved on to high school, she became the fundraising chair for the arts and music programs.

Suzy was also active in LND/SMC, serving as board member and officer several times and President (2002). Through LND/SMC members she was encouraged to join *The Christ Child Society* and worked on committees, fundraising projects and served on the board as well. Saying "yes" also got her many parish jobs: •from casseroles to communion to the sick, •prayer groups to ironing purificators, •parish council to funeral ministry. Ann Kolata was born and raised in Chicago, IL. She received her bachelor degree from Michigan State University in History, English and Political Science.

In 1967, she married James Kolata and in the next ten years they moved from East Lansing, MI, to Washington, DC, Pittsburgh, PA and Port Jefferson Station, NY before Jim began his

grams, in particular, the annual *Dia De Los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) celebration. During her time at the Snite, she was cited with the Indiana Museum Educator of the Year Award.

Four years ago, Jackie retired from a job that she loved to be "free as a bird" ... ahead of her husband's present retirement ... and to stay at home with her dog, Charlie.

Since her retirement Jackie has gotten a little more serious about her own art. IN MEMORIAM

Mary Dooley Houck

September 24, 1932 - December 8, 2015



She had eyes that smiled . .

Mary's roots in our community were deep. Her parents met in the 1920s while students at Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College. Her father went on to become Notre Dame's first Director of Placement (now called Career Services) and her mother was an early member of the Ladies of Notre Dame as well as editor of the COURIER, the Saint Mary's alumnae magazine.

Mary was born in Hammond, Indiana, on September 24, 1932, to William R. and Katharine Terry Dooley, but was raised in South Bend. She attended St. Joseph Grade School and after graduating from St. Joseph Academy, Mary enrolled in the College of St. Catherine, St Paul, MN, earning both RN and BA degrees.

Upon returning to South Bend, Mary became Head Nurse of Pediatrics at Memorial Hospital. During this time she met a Notre Dame law student named John Houck. They wed in 1955 and spent the bulk of their married life together in South Bend. Until his death in 1996, John was a renowned professor in the Notre Dame Business School while Mary continued in the nursing profession. For many years Mary and John cared for a succession of newborns, all awaiting approval for adoption. Mary also was active in the Ladies, a devoted parishioner at St. Augustine's Catholic Church and *Wednesday Coordinator* of that church's soup kitchen, as well as a volunteer in countless political campaigns and social-justice activities. Following a long decline, Mary died on December 8, 2014, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. Continuing her life-long dedication to helping others, Mary had requested that her body be donated to the Indiana University Medical School.

Mary is survived by three children, Chris (Vikki) Houck, Monica (Pete) Houck-Babij and Greg Houck, and by three grandchildren, Hanna, Gatlin and Kristen. Also surviving are three siblings, Terry (Kathy) Dooley, Brigid (Tex) Dutille and Martin (Sheelah) Dooley.

Mary's memorial service was held in Saint Joseph Chapel on the campus of Holy Cross College on December 13, 2014. Mourners representing many aspects of Mary's life filled the church, celebrating her strong faith, her lifelong thirst for peace and justice and her quiet but strong impact on the throngs of people who called her a friend. Mary loved so many and was deeply loved in return.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2014
