CHRISTMAS TEA COOKIES

$1 \frac{1}{2}$	cups butter at room temperature		Icing & Decoration
1	cup granulated sugar	1	lb. confectioners' sugar
1	large egg	5	Tbls. water, more if needed
1	tsp. vanilla extract	1	tsp. almond extract
4	cups all-purpose flour		Liquid or paste food colors
$1/_{2}$	tsp. salt	3	inch cookie cutters

- To make cookies: Beat butter and sugar in a large bowl with electric mixer until lighter in color. Beat in egg and vanilla. Gradually beat in flour and salt until blended. Divide dough in half. Wrap each in plastic wrap and refrigerate 1 hour or until firm enough to roll out.
- Heat oven to 375°. Have ungreased cookie sheets ready.



- On lightly floured surface with floured rolling pin, roll half the dough at a time to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut dough with 3 inch cookie cutter. Place cookies 1 inch apart on cookie sheets. Reroll and cut out scraps.
- Bake 11 to 13 minutes until lightly browned at edges. Remove to wire racks to cool completely.
- *To ice and decorate*: Whisk sugar, water and almond extract in a medium-size bowl until blended. Add food color. Ice each cookie with small metal spatula to within 1/4 inch of cookie edge. Let dry, about 2 to 3 hours. Makes 36 cookies.

This was followed by beef and pork recipes and Pumpkin Salad. The night ended with Mojito Cake and Coconut, Caramel, and Rum Flan. Yum!

In December, Carol Porter hosted our Italian night. We were educated by chair, Gosia Bak-Hill, about the differences between northern and southern Italian cooking. We learned that northern Italian recipes use more butter and cream and that southern Italian recipes use more olive oil. Meat is generally used more in the northern, more affluent areas, as opposed to vegetables and, sometimes, meatless recipes

in the south. As with all Italian meals, the quantities were plentiful, from the Bagna Cauda, Mozzarella and Tomato Bites, and wonderful Mushroom and Pesto Pizza, through the risotto, meatballs, Fennel and Parmesan Bake, to the wonderful Dolce: Apricot Tart, Tiramisu, Panetonne, and Limoncello. 

EVENING LITERATURE




The March 7, 2013, gathering at the home of Jessia Col-

Isabel Wilkerson's *The Warmth of Other Suns*"





It was a crisp, overcast fall day, November 9, 2012, when thirteen interested walkers journeyed across the Notre Dame campus, seeking out the works of Ivan Mestrovic that so powerfully grace it. Diana Mathias, Emeritus Curator of Academic & Education programs at the Snite Museum, shared a rich understanding of who Mestrovic was, what he has accomplished in his life, and his life and legacy at Notre Dame from 1955-1962. It was a very strong and dynamic legacy that he left Notre Dame. When he died in 1962, he was buried in his home country, Croatia, where he is considered a national treasure.

Two years later, Jim returned to Notre Dame in the physics department as the Chief Engineer in the Nuclear Structure Lab, from which he retired this past year. The LND welcomed her with open arms.

In those early 70's, she met many

Julie Marie Englehart grew up in the Chicago area. In 1978 she graduated with a bachelor degree in Earth Science from Notre Dame. This was the third graduating class of undergraduate women from the University. After graduation from ND, she received a Master in Business Administration from the University of Illinois. Working as an intern at the Illinois Geological Survey, she became interested in water resource management. This interest led her to Tucson, AZ, and the University of Arizona to take graduate courses in Water Resource Management and Hydrology. It was in Tucson that Julie met Stephen E. Silliman. Ironically, he was also from the Chicago area. Julie and Steve married in 1984, while he was a graduate student. They spent another year and a half in Arizona while he finished his PhD degree.

It had been Steve's plan to work for the US Geological Survey (USGS) in Denver, CO. However, at that time, the USGS had a hiring freeze. He eventually came to ND because the chair of the ND Civil Engineering Department had been a Professor at Princeton, when Steve was an undergraduate. This professor happened to be at a conference in Europe where Steve's PhD advisor from UA was giving a presentation describing research preformed by Steve, who was still a grad student at Arizona. Upon his return from Europe, the ND Civil Engineering Chair called Steve and asked him to interview at Notre Dame. The day after Steve accepted the offer from Notre Dame, the hiring freeze at the USGS was lifted. In retrospect, Julie and Steve definitely felt they were meant to be at Notre Dame.

Upon return to South Bend in 1986, Julie found a job with a local environmental consulting firm. She worked full time until 1989 when their first son was born. Through the birth and raising of two additional sons, she continued working part time, doing mostly technical writing,. Her oldest son is currently in his last year of Architecture at Notre Dame. Her middle son is a freshman at Purdue and the youngest son is in 8th grade. In May 2012, Steve retired from ND. In July 2012, he assumed the position of Dean of Engineering at Gonzaga University in

Spokane, WA.

Julie and her youngest son moved to Spokane just before the start of his school on September 5, 2012. She is getting settled into a new community and helping her son adjust to a new school environment.

A first generation American, she was born to the late Joseph and Nancy (Stipulin) Brozovich in Whiting, IN. She graduated from Whiting High School in 1953 and Saint Mary's College in 1957. Having later obtained a Master's degree in Music from IUSB, she taught elementary school music for 17 years for the South Bend Community School Corporation. She touched the lives of many young people in the local community.

It was at Saint Mary's College where she met her husband, John, a student at Notre Dame. A blind date led to 55 years of marriage, full of much love and many family adventures. During the school year St. Margaret's House serves on average between 90 and 100 women and children

each day. The center provides services to women to help them acquire skills needed to improve their lives. Some of these services include:

- parenting programs,
- self-empowerment programs,
- financial programs, and
- health and education programs. Programs for children ages 13 and under are also offered.

The women who join the St. Margaret's House community are encouraged to gain ownership in the community by becoming a part of the decision making and planning that takes place at the center.

All services and programs are guided by a staff of 8 with the help of over 100 volunteers. There are many opportunities to volunteer at St. Margaret's House. 
