
MENDOZA LECTURES TEN YEARS HENCE

Mary Louise "Mollie" Kohn December 30, 1927 - December 10, 2013



"She was a caring nurse"

On December 30, 1927, Mary Louise McGovern was born in Northeastern Pennsylvania to the late Harold T. and Mary L. McGovern. Mollie, as she was known, later graduated from St. Catherine's School of Nursing in Brooklyn, New York.

In 1957, Mollie moved to the South Bend area. Then on August 30, 1958, in Carbondale, Pennsylvania, she married the love of her life, James P. Kohn. Jim died on May 26, 2003. Jim was a longtime Professor of Chemical Engineering at the University of Notre Dame.

Mollie used her nursing training and skills in several area facilities including The Children's Dispensary, Northern Indiana Children's Hospital and Saint Mary's College Infirmary. Even when she retired from paid employment, Mollie continued to be a very dedicated volunteer at Sacred Heart Parish, Notre Dame, where she was a parishioner for many years, and at Saint Joseph's Regional Medical Center. Jim and Mollie raised two daughters, Kathleen Kohn and Mary Kohn, and a son, Kevin Kohn.

On December 10, 2013, at the age of 85, Mollie died at her home in South Bend, Indiana. Mollie is survived by her two daughters Kathleen and Mary and her son Kevin, as well as daughter-in-law Debra Kohn, granddaughters Sarah and Amanda Kohn, and a brother, Paul McGovern.

The funeral Mass for Mollie was celebrated at the Basilica of the Sacred Heart, Notre Dame, on December 20, 2013. Burial followed in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

AN APPEAL FROM LND/SMC President Denise Brenner . . .


