The entire movie was filmed in Sau-



dia Arabia with the director filming all outdoor scenes while sitting inside a van. This is a movie that would appeal to middle school age girls. This is a very different life than what is lived in the United States.

#### IN MEMORIAM

Eva Schwarz Eliel September 21, 1923 - March 23, 2013



Born September 21, 1923, in Hamburg, Germany, Eva Schwarz came to the United States in 1937. She graduated from Hunter College, New York, NY, and worked for Time magazine prior to moving in 1949 to South Bend, IN, when she married Ernest L. Eliel. (Eliel was a professor of organic chemistry at the University of Notre Dame from 1948 - 1972. In 1990 he received an honorary degree from Notre Dame.)

In 1972, Eva moved to Chapel Hill, NC, where she volunteered as a classical music announcer at WUNC. A long time member of the Board of Directors of the Chamber Orchestra of the Triangle, she became en Honorary Life Member in 2013. She was active in the League of Women Voters and involved in Democratic politics. Her husband Ernest preceded her in death, September 18, 2008. Her daughters Ruth Eliel (Bill Cooney) and Carol Eliel (Tom Muller) of Los Angeles and two grandsons, Ben and Sam Muller survive her.

Eva was a resident of Chapel Hill, North Carolina at the time of her death on March 23, 2013. A memorial service was held on Monday, March 25, 2013, in the Carolina Meadows Auditorium, officiated by Rabbi John Friedman with burial in the Judea Reform Congregation Cemetery

During her junior year in a statistics class, Prof. Snow gave her a CDC report on eating disorders of girls in Indiana. This started her work on the recently finished report: "Status of Girls in Indiana 2013." Now when asked how she thinks she is doing as a math major, she replies: "I'm pretty good at it!" Meghan hopes to be teaching math to middle school students in

the fall.

Emily Rojas, a sophomore student who studied abroad in South Africa last summer, related her journey of self-discovery while there. She is a Hispanic American; however, the South Africans perceived her as Asian Indian. The difficulty in South Africa is that there are so many perceived racial differ-

ences: Afrikaners (formerly called Boers = Europeans of Dutch/English descent), black, Asian Indian and colored (mixed race). Emily found herself not able to move freely within the racial groups. Living in a college residence hall, she initiated interaction. She found that the university students did not travel, yet were very interested in how freely Emily traveled. As a sociology major / justice education minor, Emily found that her experience in South Africa strengthened her and in returning to SMC, she strives to share her experiences. Both Meghan and Emily are outstanding examples of young women who are finding their way in the world, both inside and outside the walls of their college life.

the story of the change within libraries in the past 50 years. In conclusion she addressed the Notre Dame University Hesburgh Library system as it now cele-

brates its 50th year, 1964-2014.

Ms. Walker learned "to play well with others" as a music ensemble player, such that her journey from studying music and music history to becoming a music librarian was a good transition. She was a music librarian at the University of Buffalo and at the University of Virginia, prior to Notre Dame, At UVA she was encouraged to learn about library administration. Attracted to the University of Notre Dame's mission and place in the world, she did not believe that she should apply to be director of the ND university libraries but was encouraged by a mentor to do so. She related to us that we all have to "make opportunities happen for us." In addressing the young women present, she stated that the point of living our journey is to take risks along the way, understand things beneath the surface, and truly embrace the journey. This she believes she has done so far in her life.

As a librarian, Ms. Walker has moved from typing catalog cards on a manual typewriter to file in a file drawer to using the computer connected not only within the University libraries but throughout the world. All inter-library loans are online. With libraries having access to scanned books, researchers can find information and data more quickly. The evolution of the library in the digital age has transformed all of academia. However, the library still purchases books and catalogs collections. It still has conservators restoring rare documents and texts. In addition, it now stores digital libraries, large data sets and digital scholarship. It still makes an impact on our lives. It has a bright future.

#### A SHORT HISTORY OF LND/SMC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM AT SAINT MARY'S COLLEGE

The Ladies of Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College scholarship program was established in 1983 to assist local women attending Notre Dame and Saint Mary's. Over the past 30 years, the Ladies of Notre Dame and Saint College and its friends have contributed a total of \$70,960 to Saint Mary's College for the annual scholarship. As of the 2013-14 academic year, a total of 18 Saint Mary's students from the local area have benefitted from the scholarship. The current recipient is Meredith Mersits, a junior Social Work major, who graduated from Saint Joseph High School.

The Faith Always, Action Now Campaign for Saint Mary's College has raised nearly \$80 million to increase financial aid resources, support the Annual Fund, and renovate designated facilities. Saint Mary's gratefully acknowledges the participation of the Ladies in this important fundraising endeavor. Since the start of the campaign on June 1, 2008, the Ladies have contributed a total of \$18,875 to Saint Mary's College for the LND/SMC Scholarship: \$9,565 came from the organization; \$9,310 came from individual members and friends.

In November 2012, the Ladies lost a beloved lifetime member, Nancy Lucey, a Saint Mary's alumna of the class of 1957. The Lucey family named Saint Mary's as the beneficiary of memorial gifts and directed those gifts to the LND/SMC Scholarship in honor of Nancy's strong ties to both Saint Mary's and the Ladies organization. The amount designated for the scholarship in Nancy's name made a significant impact on the amount of money available for the 2013-2014 scholarship at Saint Mary's. In recognition of these gifts, The Ladies of Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College designated the 2013-14 SMC scholarship in memory of Nancy Brozovich Lucey.

During the semester, she was also an on-campus intern for the up-and-coming website *Career Athletes* (a social networking site for past and present athletes), where she made this site known and available to the SMC athletes. This internship earned her credits for her course work. She was also a volunteer assistant volleyball coach for St. Joseph Grade School, South Bend.

Meredith is pursuing a degree in Social Work, with minors in Biology and Justice Education. She has made the Dean's list for the third semester in a row and has been chosen by the chair. of the Social Work department to be her research assistant for spring 2014 semester.

One of the noteworthy programs at SMC is Belles Against Viiolence Office or BAVO. This group brings awareness about the issues of sexual assault and domestic violence in the SMC/ ND communities, as well as the South Bend community. Merdith is a volunteer advocate for sexual assault and domestic violence through SOS, which is a part of the *Family Justice Center* in South Bend. Last semester, she committed herself to the "Just Students" Advisory Committee. This semester she has planned three programs that are a part of a series through the "Just Students" Advisory Committee. One is to bring awareness about justice and sustainability in the fashion world and how thrift stores contribute to this justice and sustainability. The major project of this committee is the clothing drive from March 17-April 17, 2014. The clothing will be on sale on

April 25, 2014, in the *Just Shop Boutique* @ *SMC*. Dismas House will benefit from this sale. The Clubhouse model believes that work is critical for treatment, not just medication. Members voluntarily come in every weekday and do work that maintains the Clubhouse. 




