


Morning Literature







She learned how to be a successful teacher through professional development and teaching summer school to high school students needing credit for English I, II.

After Tulsa, she moved to Milwaukee, WI, and started as a special education teacher working at Milwaukee Collegiate Academy. This school's has a population of 100% African-American students with the mission of sending ALL of its scholars to and through college. The way in which special education works at MCA is that Meredith co-teaches with 4 different English or Writing teachers in their classrooms. She not only works with students in special education but is also learning how to write IEPs (*Individualized Education Plans*), as well as other legal documents that are associated with special education. She says: "I absolutely love it!"

Meredith did not major in education at Saint Mary's. Through Teach for America, she is a Masters of Arts Candidate in Urban Special Education at Cardinal Stritch University, Milwaukee, WI. From the Program Co-Chairs . . . Opening Reception . . .

On Monday, September 14, 2015, President Ravini Fernando welcomed new and returning members present in Club Naimoli in the Purcell Pavillion to the 81st Opening Reception of LND/SMC. She introduced chaplain Fr. Thomas Blantz, csc, who offered gratitude for the blessings on our schools, families and all those who are touched by the work of this organization. The talk was lively. The food, provided by UND President, Fr. John Jenkins, csc, through Catering by Design staff, was excellent. And what The Ladies of Notre Dame & Saint Mary's College provides for its members and perspective members was evident in displays of its interest groups and programs.

The speakers for the evening were Carol Mooney, President of Saint Mary's College and Fr. William Lies, csc, Vice President for Mission Engagement & Church Affairs at the UND.



President Mooney is completing her eleventh year as the first alumna of SMC in this position, after having spent 24 years at ND, 16 of which were in the Law School. SMC has just completed a fundraising campaign of \$105 million. In addition it has started its first Master programs since the 1970's. (SMC closed its graduate program in Sacred Theology when ND opened its program in gradu-President Carol Ann Mooney ate theology to women.) Both a M.S. program in speech & lan-

guage pathologist and a Ph.D. program in nursing practice will help fill a growing need in post graduate education. The college is doing a major renovation of its science facilities and is proud of being able to increase diversity in its student body from 8.7% to 17%. When she retires in 2016, President Mooney will be leaving SMC in very good shape.

President Mooney was congratulated for the model she has been for women throughout her tenure and most recently for her leadership in the discussion and concern for sexual violence/assault on women.

Fr. Bill Lies also thanked President Mooney for her overall leadership. As a VP for Mission Engagement, Fr. Bill stated what the issues of import are at ND; (namely, the Alliance of Catholic Education, the Center for Social Concerns and Global Affairs), to activities of the Catholic Church: in Catholic Charities, the Catholic Relief Service, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Vatican.

The University has recently renewed its 1964 com-

mitment to administer the Tantur Ecumenical Institute which was agreed to by Fr. Theodore Hesburgh, csc and Pope Paul VI. Tantur, located on a hill between Jerusalem and Bethlehem in Israel, is on Vatican ground.

The lease on Tantur was renewed on the day of Fr. Ted's wake. Pope Paul VI wanted an interfaith ecumenical dialogue with the eastern Catholic churches. Notre Dame also agreed to work with the Vatican Library over a period of the next ten years on researching: What is in the Vatican Library? Fr. Bill told the group that when he and Fr. Jenkins, along with 110 other people from ND met the Pope last spring in Rome, Pope Francis

asked that we pray for him.

The evening concluded with new women to the University/College introducing themselves. Needless to say conversation among those present continued for some time.

Trip to Potato Creek State Park

On September 22, 2015, a group of 11 LND/SMC members traveled 12 miles southwest of South Bend to Potato Creek State Park for our first Outdoor Adventures trip of the year. Luckily the weather cooperated and it was a gorgeous, sunny and warm day for our hike. The park, in North Liberty, IN, is situated around Worster Lake.

A ranger at the Nature Center gave us an overview of the park's history before we set off on our hike. We found out that the park is relatively new, starting out as a protected area in 1969. The park offers a unique opportunity, so close to South

Bend, to hike in mature woodlands, restored prairies and diverse wetlands.

We hiked through a beautiful sun-dappled deciduous

forest. The terrain was easy to traverse and afforded us lovely views of the lake and Potato Creek as we walked along. We actually covered two of the trails, stopping in between for lunch.

The park also has a paved bike path that winds through the prairie grasses, some of which were blooming purple and gold. Also, there is a *prairie grass maze*, which would be fun for families to discover. We decided that in 2-3 weeks the forests here will be glowing with red, gold and orange leaves – a reason to return soon!

Trip to Lowe's Foundation, Cassopolis, MI On October 2, 2015, members of the Ladies visited the Edward Lowe Foundation in Cassopolis, Michigan. We had a clear crisp day for the half-hour drive into Michigan. The sweeping panorama of agricultural fields and prairies welcomed us as we parked at the Visitor Center. Our tour guide informed us that the property is home to renovated houses and structures from decades past, as well as a modern headquarters building and conference center for entrepreneurs. The con-

ference center was especially unique: the lodging for conference participants is in beautifully renovated railroad train cars!

We found out that Edward Lowe was bitten by the entrepreneurial bug as a young man. A native of southwest Michigan, Ed Lowe returned from WWII and immediately started working at his father's business which sold industrial absorbents. He had a hunch that this material might be used in other ways and experimented with adapting the absorbent material as a catbox filler. He filled 10 brown bags with the material, wrote "Kitty Litter" on them, and called on the local pet store. With sand available for next to nothing, the shop owner doubted anyone would pay 65 cents for a fivepound bag of Kitty Litter. "So give it away," Ed told him. Soon customers were asking for more — and they were willing to pay for it. Thus, Edward Lowe started his "kitty litter" empire which led him to invent dozens of new products and patents.

In addition to its focus on entrepreneurship, the foundation is committed to environmental conservation and



protection of the 2,600-acre property. The property includes woodlands, lakes, ponds and streams. Additionally, one can find diverse wetland areas including cattail marshes, buttonbush swamps, sedge meadows, wet woodlands, fens and peat bogs.

Edward and his wife Darlene, built a charming home for their own use on a particularly lovely piece of the property. We toured the house and appreciated its setting in nature as well as its fashionable but comfortable décor. Additionally, the Lowes created an interesting outdoors Stations of the Cross made out of metal.



After our tour of the Foundation, the group was ready for lunch. We headed to the *Farmhouse Bakery and Restaurant*, just down the road where we enjoyed jumbo cinnamon rolls with our lunches and purchased freshly made apple pies to take home.

A visit to the Morris Inn Kitchen . . .

Germany, was excited about the newly expanded and renovated kitchen with equipment and adequate space in which to work and store food. This is the second professional kitchen that he has participated in its design. His crew numbers twenty-five, including cleaning staff, and is divided among three shifts. Two of the staff are solely



responsible for ordering and stocking of food and materials. (*See spice rakes at left.*) Bread items come daily from either the ND bake shop or from the local Breadsmith's. (*See stakes of Breadsmith's Rustic*

Because of the rapid paced activity among the workers and the tight space for visitors, not all aspects of the kitchen were observed. However, the equipment that would catch any one's eye was the 800 degree wood-burning oven where the time to cook a piz-




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sured in seconds rather than minutes. An antithesis to this is a piece of equipment (an Anti-Griddle at left) that causes in-

stant freezing to -70 degrees. All were treated to instant frozen mousse lollipops made from sour cream as well as two breakfast treats: cinnamon sour cream on warm flatbread or nutrella spread

on warm flatbread with fresh strawberries. (*See* at right.)





cooking on a stove or grill but did find out that it only takes "pushing a button" to clean an oven. The plating station can also be converted into a conveyor that allows 150 plates to be assembled in about 20 minutes. And Chef Dahms has three walk-in refrigerators!

Throughout the kitchen are areas of prep ... prepping of fruit, of meat, of vegetables. When prepared these are put in clear cases, the case dated, and either refrigerated or brought to the area where actually plating is taking place. (See below the plating of chicken salad on spinach, surrounded with fruit, and topped with a mango/red pepper salsa.) When the worker was finished she stacked her 16

dishes onto a "totem pole" with racks. She then covered the assembly of dishes and rolled it into the refrigerator.

This salad was on the menu for the lunch and the worker had many more to make for that day.



The Morris Inn's menu changes four times a year with the seasons. The chef related that he tries out his new ideas at home prior to bringing them to the kitchen. His wife is a good critic. He has welcomed the new kitchen as it has resulted in a culture change. People were given new responsibilities and tasks and have accepted them. He is very happy with how well the staff works together.

When questioned about waste, Chef Dahms said that all leftover food is donated to homeless shelters at least every other day, if not daily.

Trip to Wellfield Botanic Gardens

It was a cloudy day when 14 women and 2 pre-schoolers went to Wellfield Botanic Gardens in, Elkhart, IN. Fortu-

nately, the sun came out at times to light up the brillantly contrasting red, orange and yellow



leaves of both old forest and newly planted trees, which only last week were all green. The land is leased from the city of Elkhart for 100 years and the 24 proposed individual garden areas are nearing completion. Peggy Schoolfield, a gardener who has been employed since the garden began in 2006, said that the land is over the largest working wellfield in the city. Thirteen active wells pump water from beneath the garden. Up to 2 million gallons of water are stored in the tanks in the east end of the garden. Christina Creek (below) runs along the west side of the garden and from



it, water is released to the many re-designed ponds.

What soon becomes apparent as one walks the one mile of paths is that water is everywhere. So are stones ... some like boulders and others cut flat as steps

and pathways. The cube-like original well-houses are scattered throughout the park. Plants of fall and the end of summer pop up at every twist and turn of the pathways. Every view bringing something interesting. There are abundant wooden benches, chairs and places to sit and look at the vistas. It is a place where you would like to sit, look and contemplate. It is restful. There is no rush to anything oth-

er than the rushing water moving over rocks.

The original designer of the layout on the land was Dennis Buettner, a nationally recognized landscape architect of Buettner



& Associates, Milwaukee, WI. The garden is not yet finished. As donors are found to underwrite construction and maintenance, the gardens will be completed. In the future children will be having their own section of the park. Today, the small animal sculptures are already of interest to all young-at-heart.

In speaking with Ms. Schoolfield, you hear a sense of pride in the gar-
