
Shake off the winter blahs and get ready for spring with this one- day workshop with mosaic artist, Martha Branson-Banks. The date is Satur-

Your Story is My Story . . . Tatiana Botero Assoc. Leofessional Specialist, Notre Dame Department of Romance Languages

On February 8, 2016, Tatiana Botero told members about her summer experience walking El Camino.

Last spring, Tatiana Botero and her husband agreed with their boys (ages, 17, 16 and 8) that they wished to have a memorable vacation, one in which they would bond closely, have rules (such as having no electronics and agreement to

talk with each other), and as a service create an elementary playground as a safe environment for *El Compito* a service create an elemen-Development Center. They chose to walk the traditional 500 mile *El Camino Fran-* is ces route in northern Spain to Santiago.

Subsequently, with the support of the Center for Social Concerns at UND and the South Bend *Tribune*, they created a blog and asked for 5, 10 or 20 cents/ mile pledges. They

purchased books that gave them information of which route to follow, how many miles/day to walk, where to eat and sleep. They arranged for a "pilgrim passport" which gave them the right to make reservations to stay in pilgrim hostels. They carried all of their gear with them. . . sleeping bag, clothes, medicine, etc. The plan was to walk 6-8

hours /day in order to cover 15 mi/day for a duration of 35 days. In her own words: "The kids did great! They even ran the last mile!" Tatiana had a tough time, she was not in shape and suffered not only bodily . . . she had blisters under a toe nail as well as on her feet. . . , but also mentally and

emotionally. She said she was humbled because her husband and sons had to support her. She was not in charge.

Each day they were up at 5:00 AM, having slept in their next day's clothes They left early. Three hours later they ate

breakfast and two hours after ate lunch. They attempted to be at their next destination by 2:00 PM. They focused on "Just one day at a time." They found: "You don't need things. You need great company." When they arrived in Santiago, they attended the pilgrim Mass. One of Tatiano's memories was of the large incense burners whose fragrant smoke helped to "cover the smell of the unwashed pilgrim bodies."

The walk showed how going back to the basics, having a "lack of stuff," being together and supporting each other was worth while. They had a memorable experience together and achieved their goal. For pictures and a daily blog see: https:caminodelossjauregui.wordpress.com

Your Story is My Story . . . St. Margaret's House with Sr. Betty Smoyer, SNDdeN and Mary Fran Brandenberger

Sr. Betty Smoyer and Mary Fran Brandenberger, staff members of St. Margaret's House (SMH) . . . a day center for women in downtown South Bend . . . spoke to LND/ *SMC on January 25, 2016.*

In her retirement as a coordinator of volunteers. a caseworker and the kitchen manager at SMH, Sr. Betty told the story of the center. Now in its 25th year of operation, it is a place where women with their children come to do as varied things as make a phone call, take a shower, do laundry, and eat a hot nutritious meal. They also come to take part in programs such as parenting, health care or Bridges Out of Povcontinued on p. 7

erty. They find a supporting community of women who listen to them and help them battle the isolation of living as a single parent, coping with mental and physical health issues or being a survivor of sexual and/or physical abuse.

Mary Fran Brandenberger, the Director of

Art Programming, presented a slide show of art works by the SMH women as she talked about *Silk Creations*. This is a "program that helps women to



discover their artistic talents and gives them the tools to develop skills enabling them to succeed in the workplace." It is an empowerment for the women. They learn to create hand painted pieces of art in scarves, ties and cards. Working as a team they are operating a "business," earning money, securing personal confidence and defining themselves as artistic entrepreneurs. Easter 1916 The Irish Rebellion



On Wednesday, March 9, 2016, Laura Fuderer, LM, made arrangements for members to attend a presentation by Aedín Clements, ND's Irish Studies Librarian at the Rare Book Room in the Hesburgh Library. Clements has been recognized for "elevating Irish resources at Notre Dame to International emi-

nence." She welcomed the group and, like any good storyteller, she told an interesting story of the 1916 Irish Rising. Clements' grandmother was present in 1916 as well as in 1966, the 50th Anniversary. In 1966, Clements was old enough to understand what happened and remembers her grandmother's tales.

When Clements told the story, she used the artifacts on display to weave the episodes together.

The medal on the right is on loan from South Bend resident Michael Coughlan. It was awarded by Éamon de Valera to his father, Terry Coughlan (County Clare) for his service as an active member of the Volunteers before the 1916 Rising to the War of Independence (1919-21). "Comrac" on the bar above the metal shows that Coughlan



was an active combatant. Also in the exhibit is a listing of residents from South Bend, IN, who donated monies to the Irish cause.

One of the display cases is devoted to "77 Women" who were active participants. One woman, Grace Plunkett, was married to Joseph Mary Plunkett during the night prior to his execution at dawn. The activites of other women are also cited. In addition ND has a rare printing of W.B. Yeats Poem *Easter 1916*. In essence, Clements told us more than can be related in this short article. It is a complex tale. However, like all good storytellers, Clements ended with a few verses in Irish and then in English with . . .

That is my story. If there is a lie in it, it is not my fault.

It is not I who created it nor invented it.

If you have the time, you might wish to look in the Rare Book Room and see the display for yourself. The women went to lunch at Legends after the presentation. [The documentary 1916 Irish Rebellion will be shown at the ND Browning Cinema on March 31, 2016 (8:30 PM). It is a free but ticketed event.]

The 2015-16 Scholarship Luncheon was held in the Hesburgh/Joyce rooms of the Morris Inn. with 45 in attendance. One of the women guests said she loves to go this luncheon "as everything is so elegant!" The yellow orchid centerpieces gave a hint of spring.

During lunch the conversation was lively. This year there were three recipients from Notre Dame; namely, junior Erin Foldesi, and two seniors, Katie Martin and Susan Nace. Madison Gonzales, a sophomore, was the SMC recipient.

Unfortunately, for the members, Madison Gon-

zales is attending KwaZulu-Natal University in Pietermaritzburg, South Africa, this semester and was unable to come. Her mother and her grandmother, a present staff member at SMC, did attend. Erin Foldesi is also studying abroad in Greece for the semester. Neither she, nor her mother, were in attendance.

The invited speaker was Prof. M. Catherine Hilkert, O.P. A theologian, Prof. Hilkert has been at Notre Dame since 1995. Prof. John Cavadini says she is "a well-loved

and award recognized teacher of both undergrads and grad students." She expertly told us "what she does all day" by relating the various activities that she did in the past week: in teaching, in giving help to both graduate and undergraduates, in answering requests both inside and outside the department, in giving counsel to her doctoral students, etc.. She has talents in areas across the spectrum. Then, she told us "how she became the women she is today."

Her road to Notre Dame did not follow a straight path. Composed of many "segments and stops," she first entered a Dominican convent after high school, knowing that she wished to teach. She loved to study and eventually was sent to the University of Dayton and received a degree in French and English.

Expecting upon graduation to teach high school English, she found that her order did not need an English teacher but did need a religion teacher. Shortly thereafter, she recognized that she needed to study more theology if she was to stay as a religion teacher. Overtime she taught and acted as department chair and eventually received her MA and PhD in theology from The Catholic University of America. Guided by such theology teachers as Avery Dulles, SJ and Charles Curran, she considers herself blessed. Subsequent to time spent at Catholic U, she spent eleven years at the Aquinas Institute prior to coming to Notre Dame.

Prof. Hilkert has written four books. Women interested in the active role of women in the Church, will find the text: *Speaking with Authority: Catherine of Siena and the Voices of Women Today* an enlightening source. Catherine of Siena was a

14th century Dominican laywoman (*tertiary order*), yet she advised Pope Gregory XI to return to Rome from France and counseled many religious She was recognized as one of the Doctors of the Church by Pope Paul VI in 1970.

At the end of Prof. Hilkert's presentation, a question was asked by a guest related to the absence of women preachers in the Catholic Church. Are not the Dominicans The Order of Preachers?

Prof. Hilkert gave us her answer and then invited one of the guests,

Prof. Kathleen Cannon, OP ... another Dominican ... and Associate Dean of Science ... to give her words of wisdom on the subject and to tell of her time when she was given permission to preach.

President Ravini Fernando gave the blessing and introduced the two recipients in attendance and their mothers. She asked each to address the audience.



Susan Nace is a senior studying Mechanical Engineering at Notre Dame, who will graduat in May 2016. Playing the sousaphone in the Notre Dame Marching Band for the past four years, has been a huge part of her undergraduate career. She is currently conducting research at Notre Dame regarding polymers used in hip arthroplasty. Beginning this fall, she will be attending University College Dublin, Dublin, Ireland, working towards her master's degree in Materials Science and Engineering.




Morning Literature



SUMMARY OF LND/SMC BOARD MEETING MARCH 29, 2016

Two themes emerged from the March 29, 2016, Board meeting: defining and streamlining operations.

Catherine Kossler's Treasurer's report for the period since January showed more income, \$4,894, than expenses, \$3,313.49. This is good for our organization. Income of \$270 that resulted in coming under budget for the Scholarship Luncheon will be split between the scholarship funds for Notre Dame and Saint Mary's. At present, we have \$18, 379.99 in total assets.

The Program Committee has six events planned for the spring. Please check the Newsletter for specific details. The Board discussed the low numbers participating in many of this year's activities. The discussion also included concerns that Chairs are doing more of the foot work for these undertakings.

Rumana Poellabauer, Website Manager, reported that the web processes are in working order. Her concern is that the web is under used by membership. This led to a discussion on how to make members more aware of this rich source of information on this site.. The discussion resulted in the need for the Board to centralize information gathering and establish guidelines for information flow. Until the committee solidifies procedures, all proposals should be sent to Ravini. Ravini thanked Mary Lou Derwent, Elaine Nicgorski and Bobbie Corke for the lovely, successful Scholarship Luncheon.

The annual Business Meeting is scheduled for April 28, 2016. Ravini is still working on the venue.

A proposal for a new interest group, a *Plant Based Eating Group* suggested by Rama Ganeson, was approved. During the discussion of this proposal, the Board realized the need to define interest groups and to develop specific guidelines for establishing these groups since there are no such guidelines at present. JoAnn MacKenzie, Mary Lou Derwent, Jackie Welsh and Ravini Fernando will work on refining the process for future requests.

The Spring Tea, scheduled for April 24, 2016, at The Morris Inn, features *The World of Wearable Art*. Several area artists are contributing to this unique display.

The communication committee will meet in May to have their report ready for the new Board in August. Nancy McAdams outlined these issues for the committee's attention: protocols for technology, improved marketing for LND/SMC, and more aggressive web management.

A Day Around Town . . .



building." Each corridor has a theme ... Minos, Egypt, Thebes, etc. Many children at this school live a "crisis-life" and have experienced trauma. The entire curriculum is now infused with art. This re-make of their school has given the children a sense of pride, excitement and joy.

In addition to the physical place, the school has become of focus for Notre Dame students who visit regularly and bring both friendship and help to the students. Athletic teams regularly meet the

K-grade 6 pupils.
