



Boot Lake Nature Preserve in Elkhart

This event will take place near the end of April.

Boot Lake Nature Preserve in Elkhart consists of 60 acres of native tallgrass prairie, approximately 20 acres of savannah, the City tree nursery, woodlands, and of course, a wetland -- Boot Lake. The Preserve is an exceptional place for students and the public to learn more about our precious environment and its intricate ecosystems. Boot Lake Nature Preserve is handicapped accessible. It should be noted that Boot Lake Nature Preserve is not a park, but a nature preserve. There is a picnic pavilion that may be used by individuals and groups.

There are around 4 miles of walking trails through the woodlands and the lake. We hope to explore most of the trails.

Kal-Haven Trail, South Haven, MI

This trip will take place in May.

Kal-Haven Trail State Park is a 34-mile crushed limestone path connecting South Haven and Kalamazoo. The trail meanders through wooded areas, past farmlands and over rivers and streams. Trail highlights include a camelback bridge and covered bridge.

The trail follows the railbed laid down in 1870 for the Kalamazoo & South Haven Railroad. Opened in 1991, the trail is one of the oldest conversions in Michigan. Old depots serve as trailside visitor centers in Bloomingdale and South Haven, and an old red caboose offers trailhead services on the outskirts of Kalamazoo. The majority of the route is crushed slag and limestone and slopes gently down toward the lake.

We will drive to South Haven and start walking east. Hopefully, we will cover around 4 miles and then stop into a café in South Haven for lunch.

Scholarship Luncheon Morris Inn March 3, 2018



The sun was shining on Saturday, March 3, 2018, as sixty-five women gathered to honor the LND/SMC Scholarship recipients and their mothers. This they did well with smiles, much chatter and warm wishes everywhere. After a beautifully served lunch, they welcomed the young women who received monies from the organization. They heard of the three seniors' future plans and past accomplishments.

Associate Dean and Physics Prof. Malgorzata (*Margaret*) Dobrowolska-Furdyna was the invited speaker. She was asked to address the question "How have you come from being a college student to where you are today?" or "What do you do all day as an associate dean?" She did both. This was done with humor, a bit of modesty, and a wish that "only the sky is the limit" for the three seniors. As a faculty member she teaches an interactive introductory physics to about 150 life science majors. Her goal is to make a difference in students' lives. As a dean her life is more chaotic advising grad students, serving on 6-8 committees, answering emails, being an administrator.

Prof. Dobrowolska-Furdyna grew up in Poland. Since she hated writing and considered chemistry "too much to memorize," she chose to study physics. "In physics, if you get it, you get it!" She got it! However, as an undergraduate, she was severely challenged and questioned her own ability as a student. She received help from other students, and the problems she worked at solving became more interesting.

In Poland, at the Masters level, one chooses either to get a Ph.D. and be a scientist or chooses to teach. As a researcher she went to many

conferences, left for the West and eventually felt that she was good at it. She was fortunate to go to Purdue. There she was getting research results, fell in love, married, got a job and moved with her husband in 1986 to Notre Dame. Terrified, as she did not speak English very well, her pronunciation and grammar were poor, . . . she thought that the students didn't like her. However, as the students began to like her, she liked the students in return. She has a 14-year-old son and a great caregiver for him. Dean Crawford offered her the associate deanship. She is happy with her career and is doing less research. Her life is good.

The Dean addressed the latter part of her presentation to the three students. She told them that they have to continue to have goals. Life is not a highway telling you how to progress. She realizes now that she avoided many opportunities that were presented to her, not realizing at the time what was offered. Immediate success is not always the smartest thing that can happen to you. She advised them to continue to have enthusiasm and be

something very special. She has been able to do science research in two different laboratories on campus: one involving clinical research addressing cancer-related neurocognitive dysfunction and the other doing basic science research elucidating protein folding.

In addition, Harisa has found many outlets for contributing service to the community. As Chapter President for the local Habitat for Humanity she is coordinating events in anticipation of the President Carter Work Project 2018 in St. Joseph County. In addition to conducting nutrition talks at The South Bend Shelter for the Homeless with Social Justice in American Medicine, she has also helped in assembling "flu kits" for those in need. Art & Architecture Tour of the Main Building

Cecilia Cunningham showed an enthusiastic group the various architectural details of the French Regency style of the Main Building at the University of Notre Dame. She is a lover of clay, art history, traveling the world and 350+ hours of postgraduate studies in the arts. Her depth of knowledge amazed everyone as they found new details on a building they studied for a long time. She also pointed out the chateau style of the turrets on Sorin College.

Cecilia gave a brief history of Fr. Sorin's campaign to build the Main Building. He secured Luigi Gregori from the Vatican to paint the Basilica as well as the Main Building and described the process of painting the Columbus fresco murals. Luigi even used Fr Sorin to pose for the mural of

the Death of Columbus. To plan his paintings for the inside of the Dome, Luigi drew the figures on the inside of a bowl. Also, of note, the frescoes are dry frescoes. Whereas wet frescoes have paint adhered to wet plaster, the dry fresco is painted on dry finished walls that have been soaked with limewater. Nancy Hanson, a former University archivist, also related the story of finding and restoring frescoes of Fr. Sorin, Fr. Badin and Fr. Corby. Everyone went away with a greater appreciation of the Art and Architecture of the Administration Building and how the events and understandings of the time influenced the art.


