#### Happy Birthday, Wini!

On April 1, 2019, Winifred Caponigri-Farquhar turns 95 years old! She has contributed during her extraordinary life, under our beloved Golden Dome, a great deal to our community. Wini arrived at Notre Dame in the fall of 1946, having just married Dr. A. Robert Caponigri, who had joined the faculty of the Department of Philosophy at Notre

Dame. Wini had met Dr. Caponigri while pursuing her degree, on a full scholarship, at The University of Iowa. Little did Wini know, when she came to Notre Dame, what exciting years awaited her!

In 1950, Robert was awarded the first post-war Fulbright to Italy, and thus began the Caponigris' transatlantic life, as they would live, as a family, in Italy and Spain for a number of years. Wini, with her usual flair and style, jumped right into this life and became active at the American Consulate in Rome and Naples, Italy and in Madrid, Spain, attending and hosting a number of social events.

When back in the United States, she earned a master's degree in geoscience from Notre Dame and was the first lay, female faculty member at Holy Cross College joining the faculty there in 1969. She was Chair of the Science Department for many years. Wini taught at Holy Cross College for 31 years. In addition, she taught in the Physics Department at IUSB for over 20 years.

And let's not forget her gracious social skills! Fr. Ted Hesburgh leaned on her social graces and flair for entertaining, frequently requesting the Caponigris to host visiting dignitaries for dinner at their home.

Wini has always been extremely active in the community. A Life Member of the Ladies of Notre Dame, she served as President from 1955-1956 and is still a board member. She is also a life member and the longest living member of the Christ Child Society. Other community organizations on which she has served are Roseland Rotary, St. Joseph Scholarship Foundation board, and Michiana Gerontology board

Wini's professional affiliations include member of Delta Kappa Gamma, women in education; member of Indiana Academy of Science; member of the Mineralogical Society of America; member of the American Chemical Society; and Education-

al leader for People to People having led groups of educators to Cuba, China, Russia, Japan, Hungary, the Czech Republic, South Africa and Egypt.

Her community organizations and service include South Bend Symphony; Women's Auxiliary Committee; Sacred Heart Parish Council, Past President; and Snite Museum Friends, Member.

Wini is also an outstanding bridge player, a member of three bridge clubs in the South Bend area, and still playing and winning!!!!!

After many years as a widow, Wini married a lovely gentleman John Farquhar from the South Bend community. She also has three children (Victoria, Robert and Lisa), five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren!







## Indiana Dunes National Park Friday, May 10, 2019

Indiana Dunes National Park is our destination for a spring walk on Friday, May 10th. If you haven't been there, the park hugs 15 miles of the southern shore of Lake Michigan. The park has wetlands, prairies, forests and, of course, dunes!

We will be hiking the Cowles Bog Trail which is around 4+ miles.

The bog is actually a "fen" with an underground source of water. We will probably be able to see some lovely spring flowers in early May.

The trail is gravely in parts, sandy toward the lake, and then paved on the loop back to the parking lot. The park ranger told me that if you have knee issues, this trail might be tough at the sandy part.

#### Sr. Veronique Wiedower, c.s.c.



Sixty women responded to the invitation to share a luncheon held in the SMC Regina Hall North Lounge on Saturday, March 2, 2019. Their purpose was to meet with The Ladies' 2019 Scholarship recipients. These two local women, Mallory Spies, a junior at UND and

Yesnia Jacinto, a freshman at SMC were invited by President Meg Mitzel to speak about themselves (See elsewhere in the newsletter for these remarks.), each included thanking the organization for their support.

On the occasion of the 175th anniversary of the Sisters of the Holy Cross coming to Notre Dame, The Ladies invited the President of the Congregation, Sister Veronique Wiedower, c.s.c to address the attendees on "The Past and the Future of the Holy Cross Sisters." Many in attendance were SMC graduates. Before she began relating the early history of the order, Sr. Veronique thanked the women present for their continued support in the education of local women.

The Sisters of the Holy Cross were founded in Le Mans, France, in 1841. The following year, Reverend Edward Sorin and eight brothers left LeMans for the United States. Upon his arrival, he wrote back to Holy Cross founder Fr. Basil Anthony Moreau asking for help: "Not if, but when the sisters arrive here!" Fr. Sorin welcomed four nuns, (19, 21, 25 and 45 years old) in 1843. These women did not speak English nor were they educators.

Since the Bishop of Vincennes had already supported a group of Sisters of Providence in Indiana, the Holy Cross Sisters moved to a Michigan diocese in Bertrand to start an elementary and high school. At this time Fr. Sorin was at the place that became Notre Dame in Indiana and for several decades, the Sisters were under Fr. Sorin as a superior. Eventually the Sisters were able to have their own superior, Mother Augustus, csc, and disengaged themselves from the priests. However, the three congregations, priests, brothers and sisters, worked jointly in a common ministry. This unification also involved collaboration with the lay people within their midst.

The Sisters had strong leaders. Mother Pauline, csc, the first president of SMC serving 36 years (1895-1931) as president, was responsible for building LeMans Hall. Sister Madeleva, csc, president from

1934-61, separated the educational mission of the sisters. During her time the grade school remained on the college campus and the high school (Saint Mary's Academy) moved into South Bend. A well known poet, Sr. Madeleva was a woman ahead of her time in many ways. In 1943 she established at SMC the first graduate program in Sacred Theology that admitted women and was the only one that did so until 1970!

Presently, the Holy Cross Sisters' headquarters continues to be located on the college campus and the Generalate is the administrative arm of the order. The sisters are divided into four regions: North America, South America, Bangladesh and Africa. The future of the order is inter-cultural, primarily in Uganda, Ghana, India, Bangladesh, Brazil, Peru and Mexico. The international leadership of women religious meet in Rome.

Regina Hall, where the luncheon was held, was built as the residence for novices and postulants in the formation of the sisters. Most of these young women attended SMC as college students while in formation. (Today regular SMC students live in this residence.) Saint Mary's is the international novitiate where two years are spent in discerning "what is the life of a religious sister" by living it. Sr. Veronique disclosed that there are presently 28 women in this two-year program before taking initial vows for five years. After this time the option for perpetual vows may be given.

The future of the Sisters is shrinking in the United States and growing outside the U.S. Often American women do not wish to live in community and Vatican II has shown that there are ways to live a religious life outside of community. Today not being married does not necessarily lead to community life. Young women today are taught to be self-sufficient and Holy Cross Sisters collaborate through the gifts of the Holy Spirit in working with laymen and laywomen.

In the last century the Sisters were "the workers of the church." Today the Sisters act as "leaven," an influence that modifies something or transforms it for the better in the community. In the words of Fr. Moreau these sisters "prepare people for a world better than our own." The present crisis in religious life demands choice.

At the conclusion of the luncheon, one woman at each table took home with her the orchid centerpiece. It was an interesting and thought-provoking afternoon.

#### Mallory Spiess, UND 2020



Mallory Spiess is a junior at Notre Dame and a 2016 graduate of Marian High School. Mallory credits her experience at Marian as preparation in balancing her time, thus enabling her to succeed in multiple areas of collegiate life. As a dual degree candidate at Notre Dame, she is pursuing a Bachelor of Business Administration with a major in Marketing, along with a Bachelor of Arts with a major in Studio Art, concentrating in Photography, of which she is very passionate. This merger of diverse subjects hopefully will give her a range of opportunities for a position upon graduation.

In addition to her academics, Mallory is a member of Notre Dame Undergraduate Women in Business Club. Through the ND *Mending Minds Club*, she has achieved certification as a "Music and Memory" volunteer. The club does volunteer work with individuals who have Alzheimer or Dementia conditions. She also works as an academic mentor for Academic Services for Student Athletes and as one of the Boxing Teams Managers for the ND Boxing Team.

Mallory does not have definite plans for when she graduates; however, she is seeking internship opportunities, both locally and otherwise, for the 2019 summer. She would welcome suggestions of available opportunities. If a reader knows of any, please contact her at <mspiess@nd.edu>.

Born in Mexico and immigrating to the United States as a infant, she became a permanent resident and is now a naturalized citizen. She is the eldest of four girls. Her three younger sisters were born in the United Stated. Yesnia says that her family moved to Indiana when she was 14. Having spent the previous time in California, she found the move very difficult. She relates that being the first family high school graduate was very significant for her family. Her goal is to be the first college graduate in her family which will be even more significant. Without scholarship monies, going to college would be very difficult for her and her family. She is very appreciative of the scholarship monies given to her.

Since Spanish and math are her favorite subjects, Yesnia is considering a double major in Spanish and Marketing. Currently, living at home and not on campus, she is not engaged in any other activities on campus. However, she is currently tutoring a 7th grader, playing indoor soccer, and "babysits" from time to time. She is not sure exactly what my future plans are, but aspires to be a very successful business woman.

#### Vittoria Bosco

March 20, 1926 - February 4, 2019



Vittoria was born in Bologna, Italy, and during WWII was a refugee in Emilia, an experience that made her always remember the poor and needy. She earned her doctorate at the University of Florence, and became an English teacher. While there she met and married her husband Paul when he was a Fulbright scholar. They moved to South Bend in 1957 where Paul taught Romance Languages at Notre Dame. Vittoria taught Spanish at Saint Mary's College, and then taught Italian as as adjunct professor at Notre Dame for two decades.

They raised their four children in South Bend. The youngest, Laura, was born developmentally disabled, and Vittoria became very active in groups supporting disabled children including Logan Center and L'Arche.

Vittoria was preceded in death by her husband Paul in 2009 and her daughter Laura in 2011. She is survived by three children, Joseph Bosco, Beatrice Bosco and Peter Angelo Bosco, and five grandchildren.

A Mass of Christian Burial was held in Sacred Heart Basilica on February 6, at 3:30 PM, with burial following in Cedar Grove Cemetery, Notre Dame, Indiana.
